

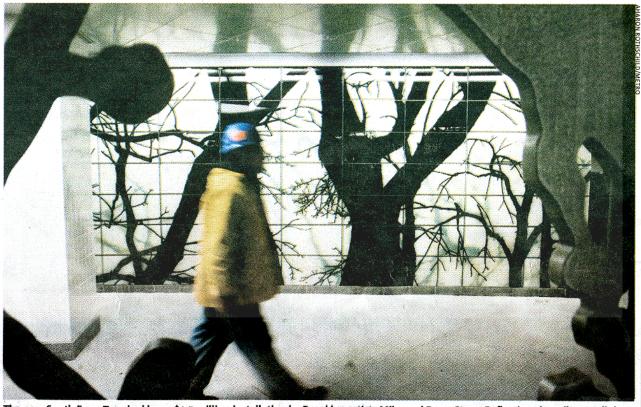

Another federally funded project, the overbudget Fulton Street Transit Center may end up getting its previously canceled stationhouse with retail shops. built in 1905 and can only accommodate the first five cars of each train. The new ADA-compliant stop will not only allow today's full tencar trains: "It's our first 21st century station," said MTA capital construction chief Michael Horodniceanu.

praising such innovations as a fire-alarm system that's connected to escalators and ventilation fans.

The first new station since 1989 will link the subway with buses and the Staten Island Ferry. Wide granite platforms will be "air-tempered," keeping temperatures cool on the hottest days, and riders can transfer to the R/W lines. More trains can be accommodated than in the old station, cutting four to six minutes off the average 1 rider's trip.

"It's overdue," Horodniceanu said. The old station will be used for train stor-
